We are taught the importance of ethics and morals from a very early age. We are taught right from wrong- that stealing, lying, cheating and bullying are things that bad people do while caring for others, working hard, respecting the rules and taking care of the environment are some of the fundamentals of being a "good person". But how do those ethics we learn in the early stages of our childhood relate to business? How can big companies ensure that **their** businesses are operating in an ethical way and why is it even important?

Writing for Forbes last year, CEO of the Institute for High-Character Leadership, Bruce Weinstein argued that "The principles of ethics that help us solve ethical dilemmas in everyday life are the same principles that provide guidance in business, health care, law and education" and he cited "1. Do not harm, 2. Make things better, 3. Respect others, 4. Be fair and 5. Care" as those key principles.

Maintaining good practices and strong business ethics should be a key consideration for all organisations, whatever the size, for numerous reasons, but the first and foremost is reputation. A positive reputation is an invaluable asset and once lost, **it** is incredibly difficult to rebuild.
